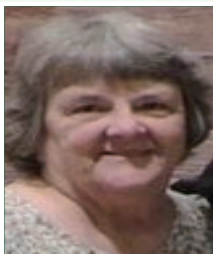

Grand Chaplain - Sue A. Moon

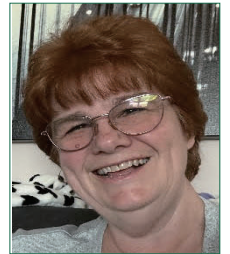

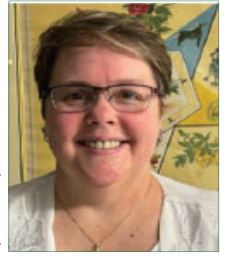
Grand Organist - Diane S. Runser

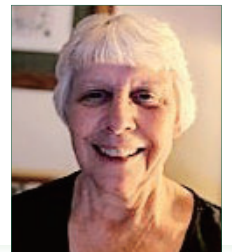


Grand Ruth - Terry L. Kamerzel

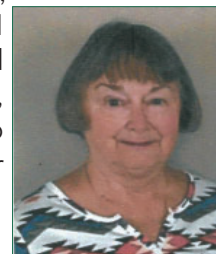

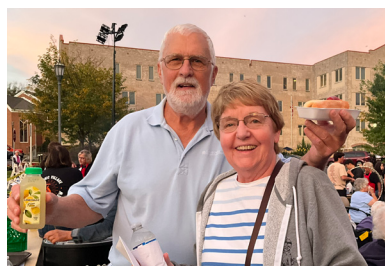


Several residents recently provided entertainment or activities for their fellow residents.

Doylestown Day with the Dogs - Jeanette A. Marschall-Galante, AGCCM Service Dogs Region 14B

On Monday, July 21, 2025, I had the pleasure of attending "A Day with the Dogs" at the Susquehanna Service Dog training facility in Grantville, PA. The event had a tremendous turnout, and it was wonderful to see so many OES friends from across Pennsylvania, including quite a few from Region 14B. Attendees brought dog toy donations, and I'm proud to say the collection grew into quite an impressive pile!

We enjoyed a fascinating tour of the facility, followed by a meet-and-greet with the dogs—though, of course, the puppies stole the show. It was inspiring to learn how each dog's natural interests and skills help determine the type of service work they are best suited for. Susquehanna Service Dogs trains several types of service animals, including guide dogs for the blind, hearing dogs, mobility assistance dogs, medical alert and medical assistance dogs, and psychiatric service dogs.



Training begins at birth. By nine weeks, puppies are placed with volunteer raisers who teach them manners, basic cues, and take them into the community for socialization. After 15–18 months, the dogs enter advanced training, where their strengths guide trainers in determining their ideal area of service.

From there, each dog is carefully matched with a candidate, and training continues with specialized skills tailored to that individual's needs. This process ensures the dog can truly empower their partner to live more independently and confidently.

I left the event deeply impressed by the facility and the incredible work being done at Susquehanna Service Dogs.

As a Physical Therapist, I have seen firsthand how these partnerships can foster greater independence, confidence, and quality of life for individuals with disabilities.

Thank you, Susquehanna Service Dogs, for the remarkable impact you make every day!
